b. Show that **F** is not independent of path by computing $\int_{C_1} \mathbf{F} \cdot d\mathbf{r}$ and $\int_{C_2} \mathbf{F} \cdot d\mathbf{r}$ and C_2 are the upper and lower halves of the circle $x^2 + y^2 = 1$

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c. Does the results from a and b contradict the conclusion of theorem 6? Explain.
