#### Checklist: Symbolism

- Is the symbol a traditional one?
- If so, is it being used in the expected way? Or is the poet playing with its associations?
- What does the image seem to mean to the poem's speaker?
- What emotions are evoked by the image?
- If an image recurs in a poem, how does it change from one appearance to the next?
- Does the image radiate meaning beyond its literal sense? If not, it might not be intended as a symbol.
