COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the discipline of art history through analysis of images, objects, and works of architecture produced from the prehistoric period of European history through approximately the year 600 C.E., including discussion of Stone Age, Mesopotamian, Egyptian, Greek, Etrurian, Roman, and Byzantine cultures. We will analyze key works of art, explore the characteristics of various artistic styles, and understand how the specific geographical, social, political, religious and historical circumstances contributed to the development of those styles. We will also work on sharpening observation skills and on developing a proper vocabulary to talk about art and architecture.

Please be aware that class materials may include some mature content.

- Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was a defining factor in the production of works of art.

- Students will investigate different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.

The term paper assignment will require a visit to a local museum, and will consist of an analysis of a piece of art from one of the periods covered in class. The details will be discussed in class. No late papers will be accepted.

Students who missed class may type their responses in short essay format, about half a page long and submit them through Turnitin.com. At the end of the quarter each student should submit one page which provides the titles/topics of the assignments that were submitted, their dates and the names of group members for each assignment submitted.
