- 1. What is the "state of nature"?
- 2. What is 'felicity', on Hobbes' view? Why does 'felicity' lead us to the 'war of all against all'?
- 3. What are the three reasons that Hobbes proposes for attacking others in the state of nature?
- 4. What is the 'natural right of liberty'?
- 5. What, according to Locke, is the "Law of Nature"?
- 6. What is the "Executive Power of Nature"?
- 7. On Locke's view, there is something like an enforceable moral order in the state of nature. Why, then, does he think that we need government?
- 8. Will Rousseau's "savage man" be inclined to attack others in the state of nature? Why/why not?
- 9. On Rousseau's view, what gives rise to the need for a state?
- 10. What is philosophical anarchism? How does it differ from other popular anarchist views?
- 11. Why, according to Wolfe, is it "impossibly hopeful" to think that government is the cause of all anti-social behavior?
- 12. What is the dilemma, according to Wolfe, that philosophical anarchism faces as a result of the existence of anti-social behavior?
- 13. According to Mill, when may the state interfere with individual behavior/choices?
- 14. Mill claims that there are some exceptions to the Liberty Principle. (There are some people to whom it does not apply.) What are these exceptions?
- 15. Does Mill advocate absolute freedom of expression? Does he recognize any exceptions?
- 16. Wolff argues that "[m]ere offence or dislike" cannot be the sort of "harm" that Mill has in mind. Why is this?

- 17. Why, according to Wolff, is the idea of natural rights "highly problematic"?
- 18. Wolff argues that "it does not follow that a utilitarian theory (of rights) would be a liberal theory." Why is this?
- 19. According to communitarians, what are the results of "denying the importance of our community?"
- 20. What is the "positive liberty" that communitarians advocate?
