Clinical (Preceptorship) Orientation / First Theory Class Combination

Our first class meeting will be a combination (a) Preceptorship Orientation Part 2 and (b) First theory class. You need to arrive prepared with paperwork for both!

This page will explain what we will be doing and guide you through the necessary preparations. Our meeting is <u>Friday of Week 1</u>, usually in the Campus Center. For the time and location please refer to the "Big Long Email" you will receive (or have received) from Mrs. Williams.

For Clinical...

Preceptorship Orientation is a 2 part process:

- 1. On Your Own (At Home): Before our meeting you need to view the orientation video, which is the bulk of the preceptorship orientation. The video is available on 3C Media (link: see "Big Long Email.") Please view early to allow ample time in case of technical difficulties. Take notes on the video to prepare for clinical experience and the preceptorship quiz (the first part of the on-campus orientation).
- 2. On Campus (date/time per email): Combination *Preceptorship orientation Part 2* and *First Week's Theory Class* (come prepared for this "double class" session). The preceptorship portion starts with a quiz on the preceptorship orientation video. This must be passed with 90% in order for you to start your preceptorship. Any uncollected hospital paperwork will be collected at this time.

Before the On Campus *Combination Preceptorship Orientation Part 2* and *First Week's Theory Class*, **please do the following:**

- Read and print or download N86L Greensheet (instructor's website main page, **not** Nursing 86 page)
- Read and print or download/bookmark N86 web pages and links, with emphasis on the following (class will begin with a quiz) many can be found on Nursing86 web page:
 - IV Therapy Guidelines
 - Commonly Used Medications
 - Preceptorship Agreement Sheet print and bring

- Your proposed preceptorship schedule, as far as you know it.
- The signature page from the current Student Handbook (located on page 6) indicating you have read and understand the policies in the Student Handbook (this would be a good time to re-read the SHB if you have not done so lately).
- Your Bloodborne Pathogen packet, complete with your personal data (Hep B info) written on the front.

• ECH signature pages (ECH students) – these will be sent to ECH students

For Theory...

Information for First Week's Theory Portion of the Class (subsequent theory classes will meet at the regular time and room, according to the schedule of classes – only the first one is different because of clinical orientation being combined with it)

Before this theory class, please do the following:

- Go to the BRN website and view the information on applying for RN licensure: http://www.rn.ca.gov/online_services/breeze_online.shtml; Read and familiarize yourself with the process. You should apply for your license approximately two weeks prior to graduation (information will be provided to you by the Board when you attend the BRN meeting).

Other Information ("the fine print")...

--You must attend all orientations plus hospital orientations in order to precept during your scheduled Quarter. All preceptorships begin the day after the HESI Exit exam (or your RN's next scheduled shift).

Things to remember (beginning of the quarter):

- · Traffic may be unpredictable
- Parking may be difficult at De Anza and the hospitals
- Late comers to any of the orientations (De Anza or elsewhere) will begin the quarter with a Reflection and a P.I.

[Speaking of PIs...if you are coming to Quarter 6 with a PI in place, remember it is your responsibility to bring a copy of the PI to your theory and clinical instructors and arrange

a time to discuss it - the very first time you see them, otherwise you risk getting withdrawn from the program. Please see your Student Handbook if you have any questions.]

MORE CLINICAL ORIENTATIONS BEFORE AND DURING WEEK 1 OF THE QUARTER (also mandatory to precept this quarter): Please keep your schedule open the weeks leading up to the quarter (during the day) until after you learn your hospital assignment and any scheduled orientation or ID badging dates/times. Depending your hospital assignment to, you may have a **mandatory hospital orientation** to attend during those weeks. These may occur at your hospital location or possibly at another location. These are also only scheduled once per quarter, and if you miss your hospital orientation, you will not be able to precept until the following quarter. Each hospital has different requirements, parking can be challenging at the hospitals, and punctuality is required at these orientations also. You must wear full De Anza Uniform or scrubs (described at orientation) + your De Anza name tag. The scrubs must be clean, wrinkle-free, and in good repair. Scrub top may have a pattern or print; white uniform pants and pure white shoes (same as the dress code from the SHB) must be worn with the scrub top. PIs will be given to anyone who fails to dress and/or act professionally at any time while setting foot in a clinical setting representing De Anza College. Remember: any time you arrive at a facility representing De Anza College (even to pick up a parking sticker, schedule – anything!) these guidelines must be followed.

IMPORTANT: Please register for the courses when you are told to do so (after your preceptorship has been secured and your instructor has been assigned). N86 is theory and N86L is clinical. N86L sections will be 55 and 56. You will be told which section of N86L to register for, depending on your hospital/facility assignment and faculty liaison. Non registered students will not be able to go to any clinical orientations until the instructor sees written proof that the student is enrolled, for liability reasons. The student who is not enrolled and misses clinical orientations will likely need to take a LOA and resume Quarter 6 the following quarter (depending on space availability). Theory class will be **every Friday** (see theory greensheet for time and location), starting Week #2.

IMPORTANT: Please ensure that your CPR and all immunizations are current **through the end of Finals week** of the quarter. Your updated information needs to be submitted to Marge by <u>the date published by the nursing department</u> or you can expect a PI - (you may dropped from your courses if the hospital deadline has already passed). Please submit each update to Marge on a separate piece of paper (do not save trees), and verify with her your currency if in doubt.
