

#### Engage the Election 2012 - Survey Results

An email with an embedded electronic link to the Engage the Election survey was sent to approximately 65 TDC Campus Coordinators on Monday, May 20, 2013. The survey closed on May 28<sup>th</sup>. This resulted in 11 valid responses for a response rate of 17%. Highlights include:

- 100% of respondents held on-campus voter registration drives followed by 90% holding on-campus forums on election-related issues while 50% of respondents held on-campus voter education forums or debate watch events.
- Approximately 5,330 total students were registered across the participating colleges.
- 36% of respondents stated each that Engage the Election activities were primarily organized/sponsored by faculty and/or administrators or collaboratively by students, faculty and/or administrators.
- 100% of respondents stated voter registration drives were very useful or somewhat useful in terms of increasing students' civic engagement and/or awareness while 73% of respondents reported that forums on election-related issues and 54% stated debate watch events were very or somewhat useful.
- 36% of respondents stated they had participated in TDCs Engage the Election webinar series while 27% did not and 36% did not know about it. Of the respondents who participated in TDCs Engage the Election webinar series, 30% found the information about TDC national partners to be most valuable.
- In regards to how useful efforts by TDC may be in helping support future Engage the Election activities, 91% of respondents stated each that, sharing of lessons learned from Engage the Election, and/or sharing of best practices among TDC member institutions would be very useful or somewhat useful, while 90% of respondents stated guidance in partnering with city, county or state governments in registration drives would be very or somewhat useful.
- 21% of respondents stated each that regional trainings or professional development meetings and/or 1-or-2 page user guides would be most useful manners in which TDC can provide assistance.

## 7. Please describe any major take-aways or lessons learned from your college's Engage the Election 2012

Even students who are not citizens are very interested in the election cycle.

Even though we only registered 55 new voters, this was the highest tally ever at the college and it created a buzz on campus about the election and the discussion on the importance of voting.

Increase teh registration drive and organize it better

Students realized how to make their voices heard on specific policy issues Students understood more clearly the practical implications of policies on their lives. They hadn't thought about this before Students expressed greater responsibility in participating in the election process. Students expressed greater responsibility to read information about candidates and policies before voting Students felt We had a lot of outside support for voter registration such as: The Black and White Reunion and the Black Political Empowerment Project's non partisan voter registration and election protection group, but we did not have much student involvement. I think one of the issues is that many community colleges are commuter colleges and our students come to take classes and then have to leave for work or other responsibilities. We also had a lot of local support to education the citizens about the new voter ID law We have found successful strategies in employing students to engage other students in the election. The student activists were from The Democracy Commitment Student Club, as well as students who were participating in class projects. We have also found that we need to "get into the world" of the students, rather than expecting them to come to an election event. For example, we held a debate watching event We really need to continue our efforts to have students, faculty, and staff become more civic engaged.
