



Career and Technical Education (CTE) Employment Outcomes Survey - 2013

De Anza College

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Background

Purpose: To provide information on employment outcomes for students who have participated in career technical education (CTE) programs at California community colleges.

Research Questions:

- Do students become employed within their field of study?
- Does community college coursework positively affected their earning potential?
- Why do students drop out of CTE programs?

Survey Development: The RP Group partnered with the Bay Area Community College Consortium and practitioners from around the state to develop a universally available survey methodology. The survey is based on completer and leaver surveys that have been conducted at several colleges and was tested through a pilot study.



Methodology

Survey sent to students if they met one or more of the following criteria in 2010-2011:

- Did not enroll in 2011-2012
- Earned a certificate of 6 or more units
- Earned a vocational degree
- Earned 9+ CTE units



Methodology


 Surveys were administered in early 2013 by e-mail then U.S. mail.

- Our total sample = 2, 710
- Number of respondents = 407
- Our college's response rate =15%



61% of respondents stated their primary reason for attending college was to earn a certificate or degree (with or without transfer)

Reason for Attending College





- Respondents who did <u>not</u> receive a degree/certificate reported why they stopped taking classes:
 - Completed their program (N = 155)
 - Met their goals (N = 158)
 - Transferred to another school (N = 92)
 - Got a job (N = 68)
 - Didn't have enough time for classes (N = 46)
 - Classes they needed were not available (N = 43)




 92% of respondents were Satisfied or Very Satisfied with the education and training they received at our college

 37% indicated they transferred to a 4-year institution to pursue a bachelor's degree

68% of respondents are employed for pay

Respondents reported their current employment status to be:






- Currently employed respondents reported how closely related their current job is to their field of study:
 - 47% reported very close My current job is in the same field as my coursework/training
 - 28% reported close I use what I learned in my coursework and training even though I am not working in the exact field
 - 25% reported not close My studies and training are not at all related to my current job



The hourly wage of degree/certificate earners increased from \$21.89 before their studies to \$26.33 after completing a degree or certificate.





Overall Findings

- Completing CTE studies and training with or without a credential – has positive employment outcomes.
- The <u>majority of respondents are employed</u>, working in the same field as their studies, and working full-time.
- Respondents saw a <u>20% increase in their hourly wage</u> after completing their studies.
- The <u>majority were satisfied</u> with the education and training they received at De Anza.
