This past academic year was characterized by an odd duality: increased enrollment and student success on the one hand, ever-increasing bad budget news from the state on the other. No annual report can begin without acknowledging the spirit of collaboration and cooperation that marked the work of our classified professionals, faculty, administrative staff and students, despite the limits on our resources and the dramatic uncertainty about the state's future funding of the college.

Our work brought success for thousands of students and their families. The recession and our reputation combined to make us the premier destination for local community college students; thousands sought enrollment even while we were forced to limit our course sections. Six thousand people showed up last month for an orientation to the college, and our relations with local schools and communities is stronger than ever.

The success of students enrolled in our new Summer Bridge and First-Year Experience program is notable and our overall on-campus enrollment is up significantly, especially among students from historically underrepresented communities. Beyond the numbers is the excitement and energy on campus for new projects aimed at retention, student community engagement and the further development of the college's cultural capacity to engage the full diversity of our students.

At the same time, we began an exhaustive review of all our programs, planned significant cutbacks in non-teaching staff, and then began all over again to prepare for next year's even worse budget news from the state. Every member of the faculty and staff lives with this uncertainty even as they do extraordinary work every single day.

This report will follow a familiar format: detailed indicators of success, the listing of important and notable achievements of our students, faculty and staff, reports from our senates and students, and summaries of the newest construction and renovation of our facilities. The familiarity of the format masks the unfamiliar terrain we're entering: serving ever more students with less and less.

Once again, it is remarkable what this college does in the service of its students and their communities. Our faculty and staff are heroes of commitment in the face of the state's lack of commitment to us, and I am proud to be their colleague.







Trends and Key Planning Indicators

The college's planning efforts rely on an understanding of key variables affecting De Anza and its ability to serve students. Important demographics of De Anza's student population include:

- Students from the college's service area account for about 21% of the student population.
- About 44% of our students come from the city of San Jose, while 12% come from Sunnyvale and about 10% from Cupertino.
- About 84% of our students attend classes during the day.
- About 39% of our students are considered full time, taking 12 or more units.
- About 1,600 international students attend the college, making De Anza's one of the largest community college programs for international students in the country.
- About 51% of De Anza's students are female.
- About 12% of our students have already completed a bachelor's degree or higher.
- About 65% of our students enrolled are 24 years old or younger.

Fall headcount enrollment increased 5.1% from 2007 to 2008: from 24,404 to 25,655 (see Figure 1).



Between 2004 and 2008, the adult population (ages 18 and over) of Santa Clara County grew by 58,457, from about 1.3 million to about 1.4 million. In 2008, De Anza enrolled about 1.89% of the adult population in the county during fall quarter, up from about 1.82% in 2007 (see Figure 2).



As depicted in Figure 3, De Anza attracted about 16% of all Santa Clara County students graduating from high school in 2008. The participation rate is a 2 percentage point increase from 2007 to 2008, at a time when the number of graduates in the county increased by about 5%.



As depicted in Figure 4, full-time equivalent student (FTES) enrollment has increased an estimated 1% from 2007-08 to 2008-09. The increase was in spite of a loss in WSCH from new state rules on added instructional (To Be Arranged) hours associated with some courses and the decision to reduce the Job Corps program.



The De Anza student population includes a diverse array of ethnic groups. Students identifying themselves as Asian, Pacific Islander and Filipino comprised about 38% of the headcount enrollment in the fall of 2008. The Other/Unknown population increased from 10% to 19% in fall 2008 (see Figure 5), likely as a result of new federal regulations on the collection of ethnicity data that do not allow a "decline to state" option.



The fall-to-winter persistence rate of first-time De Anza students (new college students as well as students who may have previously attended another college) has increased by 3.6 percentage points from 2007 to 2008 (Figure 6).



The basic skills course success rate dropped by 3.3% percentage points from 81.9% in 2006-07 to 78.6% in 2007-08 (Figure 7). This is likely due to the recoding of some Math and English courses as basic skills. De Anza continues to focus on improving the course success rates as well as the persistence rates of students taking basic skills courses.



Another measurement of college outcomes is the number of degrees and certificates awarded (Figure 8). Between 2006-07 and 2007-08 the number of degrees awarded remained constant, but there was a slight drop in number of certificates awarded.



As depicted in Figure 9, about 2,300 De Anza students transfer each year to a UC, CSU, in-state private or out-of-state college or university. The number of students transferring to UC and CSU campuses has remained relatively constant from 2006-07 to 2007-08. In 2007-08 De Anza had the fourth largest number of combined UC and CSU transfers in the state, with 1,837 students (compared to the highest, Santa Monica's 2,111).



As depicted in Figures 10 and 11, there remain differences in course success rates among ethnic groups. The ethnic groups have been aggregated in these two charts for easier reading. The two figures show the percent of students starting in a basic skills course who are successful in the next course. For English writing (EWRT), there is considerable variation between Asian and other students on this measure.



As noted in Figure 11, the success rates from Math 112 to Math 114 are lower compared to EWRT, but there is less variation among ethnic groups. Still, for the 2004-05 cohort (tracked for 15 quarters), 57% of Asian students (N represents number of students at start of cohort; N=235), compared with 39% of African American students (N=34) successfully moved from Math 112 to Math 114.



Compared to other community colleges, De Anza's course success rate is considerably higher (Figure 12). In 2008 the overall success rate increased slightly and remains about 10 percentage points above the statewide average.



Sustainability, Facilities, Equipment and Technology, Including Measures E and C

Sustainability

In 2008 De Anza adopted a Sustainability Management Plan (SMP) to guide the college toward becoming fully sustainable. The SMP addresses all aspects of college operations and their impact on the campus and community. The plan includes community vibrancy, environmental stewardship, social equity and financial responsibility. Steps taken this year include:

- The revitalization of the campus recycling program.
- The completion of our participation in the pilot project for Sustainability, Tracking, Assessment and Rating System (STARS) sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education (AASHE). STARS is a voluntary, self-reporting framework for gauging relative progress toward sustainability for colleges and universities. De Anza was one of seven large community colleges that participated in the pilot project. Once AASHE releases the rating system that was developed from the pilot project, De Anza plans to participate in the continuous evaluation process of its sustainability efforts.

Facilities, Equipment and Technology

Three additional Measure E projects were completed this year: the Visual and Performing Arts Center, Landscape Phase 1 and Signage Phase 1. Under Measure C, construction began on E-1 (Auto Technology) and design was completed on two projects, Seminar Building & Multicultural Center and the Baldwin Winery & East Cottage. Design for the Mediated Learning Center will be completed this calendar year.

Measure C funding provided us with the opportunity to purchase new furniture for 36 classrooms in the L Quad and one in P.E., install 17 multimedia classrooms and refreshed 8 computer labs with new equipment. We were also able to purchase 104 task chairs for faculty and staff, and 42 faculty and staff will receive new office furniture.





Projects Completed

Measure E

Visual and Performing Arts Center (VPAC) – The VPAC was completed in fall 2008 and classes began in January 2009. The facility houses the Euphrat Museum, an art history classroom and a 400-seat main stage venue for music, dance and film. We are in the process of completing the application for a LEED® Silver designation. Once the application is approved VPAC will be the fourth LEED® project on the campus. The budget was \$19,145,000.

Landscape Phase 1 – This project began in June 2008 and was completed in October 2008. The primary components of this project are irrigation, a weather station that monitors current conditions and regulates irrigation based on those conditions, plantings along the east side of campus and within S and L Quads. The budget was \$1,216,514.

Measure C

Signage Phase 1 – The campus has never had adequate vehicular and pedestrian signage. This project provided the first phase in achieving a comprehensive signage program for the campus, including new entry signs at the corner of Stelling and McClellan roads and at the East and South Entrances. The project, which was completed before fall quarter began in September, included new building, pathway and vehicular signage along Campus Drive. The budget was \$651,000.

Projects in Construction

Measure C

E-1 Auto Technology – Design was completed under Measure E and construction began in March 2009. The construction is scheduled for completion in late November and classes will resume in the renovated facility in January of 2010. The current budget for this project is \$3,847,545.

Projects in Programming and Design



Baldwin Winery Building and East Cottage – Because of the historical significance of these two facilities the programming and design are being managed by one architect with expertise in historical renovations. The design for the renovation was completed last winter and the project was slated to begin construction during spring quarter. However, because of the need to retain on-site classrooms to accommodate enrollment growth due to the discontinuation of the offsite Job Crop program, the construction of this project has been postponed until summer 2010. When the renovation is completed, the Baldwin Winery will house the complete Financial Aid and Scholarships Office, a copy center and part-time faculty offices. The East Cottage will provide additional instructional space that will be home to a smart classroom, an oral history lab and the Institute for Community and Civic Engagement (ICCE). Renovations will be in keeping with its historical significance and properties. The current budget for this project is \$7,544,095.

Seminar Building and Multicultural Center – The Seminar Building was originally slated for renovation under Measure E. This building will house programs displaced by the Mediated Learning Center, including the Occupational Training Institute (OTI) and CompTechS. The Multicultural Center renovation will upgrade classrooms, improve the division offices for International and Intercultural Studies (IIS), and enhance and expand the multipurpose facilities used by various leadership activities including Asian Pacific American Leadership Institute (APALI) and Latina/o Empowerment at De Anza (iLEAD!). This renovation will also include creating a distinctive entrance and learning environment for a variety of programs and services centered on culturally competent instruction. The design and construction of these two facilities will be managed by one architect to achieve efficiencies in the design effort and potential construction cost savings. Construction on this project will begin in late August or early September. The current budget for this project is \$7,057,750.

Mediated Learning Center – The Mediated Learning Center is the only large cap, new building project in Measure C. This building is being programmed as a LEED® Platinum facility, the highest LEED® achievement. The 54,000-square-foot facility will be home to 13 classrooms for programs such as World Languages, Anthropology and general instruction. The building will also bring together the Office for Mediated Instruction, Staff Development and the Technology Resources Group (TRG) to create a state-of-the-art faculty resource area in support of mediated instruction. The roof will house a large photovoltaic array. The design will integrate leading edge heating, cooling and ventilation systems as well as natural day lighting in all the classrooms for enhanced student learning. The project is in the construction drawing phase and is slated to begin construction in the spring of 2010. The current budget for this project is \$52,375,504.

De Anza Academic Senate Summary of Achievements 2008-09 Anne Argyriou, President

Academic Senate Web Site

The Academic Senate Web site provides senate news and information and serves as an archive of important senate documents and as a portal to other Web sites and resources for De Anza faculty. See www.deanza.edu/gov/academicsenate/.

Annual Scholarships Awarded

Two \$1,000 senate scholarships are awarded to De Anza students every June. One is given to a student majoring in a vocational field, the other to a student who is transferring and majoring in a teaching, counseling or librarian field. The senate continues to make progress toward the goal of endowing these scholarships through donations from faculty and others.

Courses and Disciplines and FSAs

The Academic Senate maintains and annually updates the assignment of qualifying disciplines and Faculty Service Areas for each course approved for offering by the college.

Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee is a subcommittee of the Academic Senate. Through this committee, faculty members establish and maintain the quality and integrity of the curriculum. The Curriculum Committee, in conjunction with the Academic Senate, continued discussion of Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) and continues to identify and implement the writing and assessment of course-level outcomes.

In 2008-09, the Curriculum Committee reviewed and approved 57 new courses, 230 revised courses, and 44 revised and 1 new certificate and degree requests. The approval and redesign of certificates, course renumbering, distance education course approval, and TBA hour review due to new state mandates have all been accomplished or are significantly under way.

General Education Review

A steering committee for the General Education (GE) review, consisting of members from both the Academic Senate and the Curriculum Committee, continued its work on both the Institutional Core Competencies and the GE pattern and requirements this academic year.

Institutional Core Competencies

The GE Committee, with the assistance of both the SLO and SAO coordinators, solicited and received feedback regarding the first draft of the institutional core competencies from all of the academic divisions of the college. After a review of all feedback, which resulted in significant revision of the core competencies, an updated version was presented at a Town Hall for faculty, as well as reviewed further by the Academic Senate. After further discussion and revision, the final version of the Institutional Core Competencies was adopted by the Senate in March 2009 and presented to College Council.



De Anza College GE Pattern

Now that the Institutional Core Competencies have been completed, the GE Committee is currently reviewing the GE pattern and requirements for their scope, relevance and alignment with the Institutional Core Competencies.

Student Learning Outcomes

The Academic Senate, after careful review and consultation with statewide faculty SLO experts, opted to split the SLO coordinator position into two: one Student Learning Outcomes coordinator, and one Service Area Outcomes coordinator. The new SLO coordinator is **Coleen Lee-Wheat** (Physical Education) and the new Service Area Outcome coordinator is **Jim Haynes** (Adapted Physical Education and Physical Education). Both began their terms in January 2009.

Both coordinator positions are responsible to the Academic Senate's Committee on Curriculum and, by extension, to the Academic Senate Executive Committee. The SLO coordinator will provide leadership and guidance to faculty in developing and assessing course and program level Student Learning Outcomes, and the SAO coordinator will provide leadership and guidance to faculty and staff in the required creation and assessment of outcomes in the student service and college service areas.

Per the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges' (ACCJC) rubric for Student Learning Outcomes, the focus for this academic year was to move through the awareness phase into the development phase, by establishing the institutional processes to support the development and implementation of the Student Learning Outcomes and Assessment Process. The overall goal was to train faculty and staff in writing and assessing SLOs and SAOs. The following events were conducted:

- An assessment workshop for members of the Academic Senate and Curriculum Committee, to choose an assessment method to use for SLOs.
- A "train the trainers" workshop for faculty from each instructional division who learned how to write SLOs, develop assessments for those SLOs and train other faculty to do both. These faculty are also serving as pilot faculty in two projects itemized below.
- The pilot group of faculty are holding workshops for division faculty members in how
 to write SLOs, with the result of actual SLOs written for high-enrolled courses for each
 department within the division. This division-wide training is under way and will
 conclude by fall 2009.
- A pilot group of faculty was formed to write and assess SLOs in the spring 2009 quarter. This project is under way and will be concluded in fall 2009.
- A workshop for employees from service areas across the college in which they learned how to write and assess Service Area Outcomes.



- A timeline and implementation plan for SLOs and SAOs for the academic years of 2007-08, 2008-09, and 2009-10 was developed and submitted to both the Academic Senate and the college's administration.
- Andrew LaManque, De Anza Institutional Researcher and Accreditation Liaison Officer, and Julie Ceballos of the De Anza Web Team developed a Web site (www.deanza.edu/slo) specifically for SLOs and SAOs.

District Activities

The Academic Senate has a special role in developing and recommending policy on academic and professional issues. In this capacity, senate officers have represented faculty at board meetings on important topics. Senate officers are members of the Chancellor's Advisory Council (CAC) and the Academic and Professional Matters Committee (APM), in addition to working on other projects with the district such as District Opening Day activities. The Academic Senate collaborates with the Chancellor in reviewing board policy for possible recommendations for change.

Shared Governance

The senate participates in all shared governance activities at the college. The Academic Senate has a special shared governance role regarding academic and professional issues such as curriculum, faculty hiring, tenure review, and budget and program review processes. In addition, the Senate Executive Committee and senate officers meet frequently with college President Brian Murphy in a direct and collaborative manner, formulating shared responses to the many issues that meet the college on an ongoing basis that do not call for district-level action.

State Academic Senate

Senate officers participated in statewide Academic Senate for the California Community Colleges (ASCCC) activities including the fall and spring plenary sessions. Math instructor **Barbara Illowsky** served as the Area B Representative on the ASCCC Executive Committee this academic year, a position to which she was elected the previous academic year. De Anza Academic Senate officers participated in the formulation of state senate policies, the writing of papers adopted by the state senate and the presentation of breakout sessions at plenary sessions. The ASCCC is the main organization for faculty to advocate for changes to Title 5, which occurs through resolutions passed at the plenary sessions.

These included Area B Representative (and Math instructor) Illowsky's presentation on the Basic Skills Initiative, and Senate officer (and Music instructor) **Paul Setziol**'s presentation in the fall plenary. During the spring plenary session, Setziol presented on defining the associate's degree. Illowsky also led a collaborative effort on the Reading Competency requirement with reading instructor and Academic Senate President **Anne Argyriou**, and two other reading instructors from two other colleges, which resulted in an ASCCC system wide survey and presentation at the Spring Plenary.



De Anza Classified Senate Summary of Achievements 2008-09 Al Guevara, President

De Anza's classified professionals continue to participate in the Classified Senate and in the college's shared governance process. Classified professionals are proud of their tradition of exemplary service to the college and our students. The senate leadership continues to work toward the opportunity for all classified professionals to participate in Classified Senate activities. This includes working with the college administration to ensure that all classified professionals have greater opportunities to fully participate.

The SEIU contract negotiated last year offers classified leadership an opportunity to give adequate, quality time to participate in campus committees. It also provides office space for the Classified Senate to have an equally visible location as other campus constituencies.

Classified Senate is grateful to college President Brian Murphy for his support and encouragement of classified professionals to participate in shared governance across the campus and the district. The full participation of Classified Senate representatives is critical for the smooth operation of our shared governance process.

We are also proud to have sponsored and co-coordinated a joint Classified Retreat with Foothill and Central Services Classified Senates. The joint event symbolized a renewed commitment to working across both campuses to enhance our professional relationships. Many attendees voiced their appreciation for the joint effort and encouraged the senates to make gathering an annual event.

De Anza Associated Student Body Summary 2008-09

Managing an annual budget of nearly \$1 million this past year, DASB focused its attention on affecting De Anza students directly by funding programs that provide academic benefits, leadership skills, community engagement and the chance to pursue individual interests. In promoting the well being of each student, DASB funded programs and clubs that enabled proactive participation in campus life that might not otherwise have been possible. For example, students received free tutoring at the Tutorial Center, received up-to-date news in La Voz, listened to numerous bands that visited the campus and performed in the Campus Center Patio, and much more.

This year DASB provided funds for the Creative Arts Division, Athletics, scholarships, the Multicultural Author Reading Series, and textbook reserves at the Library and the Tutorial Center. DASB also funded programs that promote diversity and student success, such as the Puente Project, Lifetime Fitness and Wellness Center, and the Math Performance Success program.

In fall 2008, DASB organized and promoted student voting in the national election through rallies, e-mails and information tables. It also implemented online voting for its 2009 DASB elections, in which more than 2,400 students voted, a record participation. About 450 De Anza students rode five buses to Sacramento for the March in March, one of the largest turnouts from the community colleges.

DASB also took the initiative to address the school mascot (the Dons), and has made intensive efforts to involve the entire campus community in finding a new mascot for De Anza. The Senate solicited designs and ideas for the mascot and will continue working on the project next year.

The student government budget for 2009-10 will continue to support students in their academic goals, personal growth, diversity and equality for all De Anza students.





Notable Achievements of Students, Faculty and Staff

Student Achievements

Scholarships

Biology major **Yessenia Ramirez** of Sunnyvale was awarded a \$20,000 Karl S. Pister scholarship to UC Santa Cruz for fall 2009. Ramirez was one of the student co-founders of the iLEAD! Latina/o student leadership program and also served as a DASB senator and vice president. Ramirez works in the Writing and Reading Center as a student assistant, and volunteers with Cross Cultural Partners and the Veterans Affairs hospital.

Nursing student and Santa Cruz resident **Alicia Kosman** received a \$5,000 Kaider Scholarship President's Award from President Brian Murphy. Kosman graduated from De Anza's Nursing Program in winter 2009. The scholarship was made possible by the Steve and Lola Kaider Foundation to help students reach their goal of an associate's degree.

The 2009 DeHart Memorial Scholarship for Service goes to **Alejandro Jimenez** of San José, who will graduate in June with a 3.670 GPA. Jimenez, a native of Mexico, will transfer to UC Berkeley and major in anthropology, with a minor in creative writing.

Two President's Awards will also be presented at the June graduation ceremonies. **Jake Parent** of San José maintained a 4.00 GPA in his political science major and plans to transfer to SJSU in the fall where he will major in political science with a minor in Spanish. **Kenia Vega**, also of San José and a liberal arts major, will graduate with a 3.29 GPA and will transfer to SJSU or Santa Clara University with a major in communications.

Athletics

De Anza College won the Coast Conference All Sports Trophy for 2008-09 (formerly the Bud Ottmar Award). This is the 15th time De Anza has won in the 25-year history of the award.

Falke Verwer, Men's Soccer, was named to the 2nd Team USA All-West Region.

Abiy Gebrekristos, Cross Country, was named to the 2nd Team All-Northern California.



Luis Nunez, Cross Country and Track and Field, was named the Soccer Referee of the Year by the California Youth Soccer Association (CYSA).



The **Men's and Women's Track and Field team** had 17 state qualifiers in the State Meet, the highest number in school history.

Leticia Ng, Women's Swimming, was named Coast Conference Champion in three events: 50-meter and 100-meter breast stroke, setting new school records, and 100-meter individual medley. Ng qualified for state competition in all three events. De Anza had four Coast Conference Team Champions for the 2008-09 academic year: Women's Cross Country, Women's Soccer, Women's Swimming and Women's Tennis.


Vanessa James and **Kirsti Whitmyre**, Women's Cross Country, were named to the 1st Team All-Northern California and 2nd Team All-Northern California, respectively. James was also named Female Cross Country Conference Championship MVP.

Whitnee Garrett, Track and Field, made the honorable mention list for the 2009 NATYCAA Scholar Athlete of the Year Award. NATYCAA stands for National Alliance of Two-Year College Athletic Administrators, and this is the first such recognition for a De Anza student athlete.

Megan Finney, former soccer and softball student-athlete at De Anza, was named Softball Player of the Week by the California Pacific Conference for April 6-13, 2009. Finney plays first base and outfield for Menlo College.

Andrea Nott, currently studying business at De Anza, and Christina Jones, a former De Anza student, earned fifth place in the duet portion of the synchronized swimming competition at the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing. Their team also placed fifth overall in the event.

Gerardo Alvarez, Men's Soccer and engineering major, was named Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year and has a 3.7 GPA. Whitnee Garrett, Track and Field, was named Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The history major has a 3.7 GPA. Each student will receive a \$1,000 scholarship and be nominated for the state scholar athlete award sponsored by Pepsi. Runners-up, who will each receive \$750 scholarships, were Carl Canning for Water Polo and Mayra Barragan for Soccer.





Priya Prasad and **Diane Lutran**, Women's Tennis, were named the Coast Conference Doubles Champions in April 2009. Prasad was also named Coast Conference Individual Competition Champion.

Albert Godjali and **Nick Martinez**, Men's Tennis, won the Coast Conference Doubles Championship on April 18, 2009 under the direction of Coach **Kelly Simons**. Godjali was also named Individual Competition Runner-up.

For the fifth straight year the Women's Soccer Team finished first in the Northern Division of the Coast Conference, making them champions for eight of the past nine years. Sophomore **Jenny Kute** was named Conference Player of the Year, and freshman **Jen Herrera** was named Conference Midfielder of the Year. Both players were also named to the NSCAA (National Soccer Coaches Association of America) 1st Team All America, NSCAA All-West Region and the All Northern California team. The coach is **Cheryl Owiesny**.

The De Anza Athletics Program was named best comprehensive program in the Coast Conference.



Civic Engagement

As the result of a dialogue between two De Anza students, a U.S. veteran of the Afghan War and a woman from Afghanistan, an art installation called "Counting Lives Lost: Making Tangible an Abstract Measure of Grief" was brought to campus on April 18 and 19, 2009. The artwork by **Kathleen Crocetti** (a member of Blue Star Mothers, whose son is serving in the Air Force) is a visual representation of 4,274 American casualties and more than 99,000 Iraqi dead since the beginning of the war in Iraq. The installation took 600 people-hours to construct, so the whole building process was designed to be part of the dialogue.



Creative Arts


Eight De Anza students won awards in multiple categories at the 2009 California Community Colleges Media Arts Competition. Animation students won three of the 14 college categories: Traditional Animation, Computer Animation and 3D Digital Imagery-Cinematic Still. This swept the animation-related categories and gave De Anza more category winners this year than any other school in the state.

Two of Lisha's former students were accepted into prestigious UCLA programs: **Robert Phelps** to the university's screenwriting master of Fine Arts Program and **Kaushik Sampath** to its Film Directing Program. Both students credit De Anza's film program and instructors for encouraging them and making their success possible.







Two De Anza Film/TV students were the sole San Francisco Bay Area winners in the WILDsound One-Page Screenplay Competition, and once again De Anza was the only community college in the Student Shorts Competition at the Cinequest Film Festival in February 2009. Jennifer Gonzalez and Matthew Ritter were among 20 winners in the international screenwriting competition. Gonzalez's "De-Lecter-Ble Delights" and Ritter's "Night Terror" were read at WILDsound's March event in Toronto, Canada. Students Jennie Yim, Keenan Manely, Jake Rossi, William Yang, Leo Aquino and Jonathan Oren created the cel animation for the music video "Welcome to the Third World," directed by animation instructor Webster Colcord. And two student films were selected to compete in Cinequest's Student Shorts category: "Laundry" by Samuel Cheung and "In Search For I" by Gustav Asplund. De Anza entries competed among short films from UCLA, University of Southern California, New York University, Stanford University, Columbia University, University of Texas. Austin, and the American Film Institute. Instructors for these students were **Dennis Irwin** and **Barak Goldman**.

De Anza's **Vocal Flight** came in first place at the Reno Jazz Festival in April 2009. Directed by **Michelle Hawkins**, Vocal Flight members are: **Sila Charukesnant**, **Masako Okada**, **Taline Palmer**, **Joellen Persad**, **Kevin Van** and **Zach Yaholkovsky**. The group was also named a finalist in the Next Generation Competition for the Monterey Jazz Festival and will compete for a cash award and a performance at the prestigious festival in fall 2009. Only six ensembles from across the country received this honor.
