- ➤ In Fall 2003, 1 out of 6 or 12% of De Anza College credit students was living in Sunnyvale. Put differently, more than 3,000 of the approximately 25,000 students was from Sunnyvale.
- ➤ 12% of a roughly 60 million dollar budget means that Sunnyvale students generate an estimated 7 million dollars in revenue each year for De Anza, just for the credit program.
- According to the California Postsecondary Education Commission, in Fall 2002, the number of <u>Fremont High</u> graduates attending De Anza was equal to the number attending a CSU and UC combined.
 - Of the June high school graduates that go on to a public college in the fall, more than 1/3 attend De Anza.
 - Of the June high school graduates that go on to a community college in the fall, almost 2/3 attend De Anza.
- Asian Indians made up about 8% of students living in Sunnyvale and attending De Anza in Fall 2003, which is twice the percentage from all other areas.
- ➤ Of the South American students attending De Anza in Fall 2003, 19% were living in Sunnyvale.
- ➤ Of the students on a H1 or H1B work visa attending De Anza in Fall 2003, 28% were living in Sunnyvale.

- ➤ Sunnyvale ranks number 3 behind San Jose and Cupertino in terms of the place of residence for employees working at De Anza.
