Transfers to UC campuses increased 4% from 2010-11 to 2012-13 but decreased 10% • between 2012-12 and 2012-13.

• The highest number of transfers in 2012-13 were to Davis (25% of all transfers), followed by Berkeley (18%) and San Diego (17%).

• Transfers to CSU campuses has seen a three-year trend in decreased transfers, between 2010-11 and 2011-12 CSU transfers decreased by 5% and continued to fall by 9% from 2011-12 to 2012-13. This is a direct result of changes to the San Jose University's admissions procedures. SJSU declared all majors "impacted" in 2011-12 and now ranks

applicants by GPA, resulting in students competing for available spots within each impacted major. SJSU also eliminated its local service area preference. Specifically, 778 students transferred to SJSU in 2012-13 compared to 984 in 2010-11.

• However, the highest number of transfers in 2012-13 were still to San Jose (64% of all transfers), followed by San Francisco (14%) and East Bay (9%).

• In 2012-13, Asian students transferred at the highest rate, over 36% of all transfers, followed by White students at 19% of all transfers; Latino students made up 15% of all transfers.

• Transfers by Latino and Filipino students increased between 2010-11 and 2012-13 by 3% and 28% respectively. African American students decreased at the highest rate (48%), from 48 transfers in 2010-11 to 25 transfers in 2012-13.
