General Education Requirements

Effective Fall 2004 through Summer 2005.

De Anza College offers two associate degrees, the Associate in Arts (A.A.) and the Associate in Science (A.S.). In order to obtain either degree, you must complete between 31-42 General Education (GE) units and additional unit requirements in your major. The number of units required for a major will vary from program to program. To qualify for the associate degree, you must complete a total of 90 units including General Education, major, and, if needed, elective courses of your choice.

The General Education subject areas listed within the left column below reflect De Anza College's associate degree requirements. However, to support your transfer to the University of California and/or California State University, you should also complete the requirements listed under the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or CSUGE Breadth. See pages 46 and 47 for approved course lists.

Transfer students in high unit majors may be advised to focus on the requirements for the major and completing minimum admissions

requirements instead of concentrating on completing IGETC or CSUGE Breadth requirements.

Once you complete the IGETC or CSUGE Breadth, the requirements for your major, and any transferable electives necessary to bring your total units to 90, plus earn the required GPA for that school, you may qualify for both De Anza's associate degree and for transfer to a university. (See the following pages for a listing of courses that meet De Anza's GE, IGETC and CSUGE Breadth requirements.) The associate degree is not required for transfer.

Students who want to transfer may elect to complete the specific General Education-breadth requirements of the transfer institution they select.

General Requirements For The Associate Degree (A.A./A.S.)

1. Complete a minimum of 24 quarter units in residence at De Anza College.
2. Complete a minimum of 90 degree applicable quarter units, with at least a 2.0 grade point average for all major courses, for all De Anza College course work, and overall transfer work and De Anza College work combined.
3. Complete all courses required in the major (a maximum of 22 quarter units from another college or university may be applied toward the major).
4. Demonstrate proficiency in reading, written expression and mathematics.

Reading and Written Expression:

- Completion of EWRT 1A or ESL 5 or equivalent with a grade of "C" or better (or)
- Achieve a score of 3 or higher on either AP Language and Composition or AP Composition and Literature exams

Mathematics:

- Completion of MATH 104 (Applied Technologies majors only), or MATH 105 or MATH 114 or equivalent or higher with a grade of "C" or better (or)
- Achieve a score of 3 or higher on one AP mathematics exam (or)
- Satisfactory score on the De Anza College Intermediate Algebra Placement Test

Essential Skills/Breadth Requirements 2003-2004

The following summarizes the breadth requirements for the B.A./B.S. Degree in the College of Letters and Science at UC Berkeley, and lists the De Anza College courses that count toward satisfaction of those requirements. **Check the UC Transferable Course Agreement (www.ASSIST.org) for limitations on De Anza courses accepted.**

These requirements are not valid for other colleges of the University of California, Berkeley (e.g., Chemistry, Engineering, Environmental Design, Natural Resources), or for other University of California campuses. See a counselor or academic advisor for further assistance.

I. Requirements to be completed prior to transfer with junior standing

If you have completed 90 or more transferable quarter units, you will be applying for admission as a junior, and you will not be considered for admission unless you have completed the requirements outlined below. For admission, requirements must have been completed by the end of the Spring term prior to Fall transfer.

A. Essential Skills

There are three essential skills requirements: Reading and Composition, Quantitative Reasoning and Foreign Language. All courses used to satisfy these requirements must be taken for a letter grade.

1) Reading and Composition:

- a) To satisfy this requirement at De Anza, complete EWRT 1ABC with letter grades of “C” or better; courses may not be taken on a CR/NC basis;

At De Anza: EWRT 1A + EWRT 1B = Berkeley’s English 1A
 EWRT 1B + EWRT 1C = Berkeley’s English 1B

OR:

- b) Achieve an appropriate score on the College Board Advanced Placement (AP) examination as follows: a score of 4 in English Literature and Composition will satisfy the first half of the requirement, a score of 5 will clear the entire requirement; a score of 4 or 5 in English Language and Composition will satisfy only the first half of the requirement. The examination must be taken before you enroll in the College of Letters and Science; OR
c) Achieve a score of 5 or better on the International Baccalaureate Higher Level Examination in English Language A1; OR
d) Obtain a grade of C or better in the GCE “A” Level English Exam.

2) Quantitative Reasoning:

This requirement may be satisfied in one of the following ways:

- a) Score 600 or more in mathematics section of the SAT I: Reasoning Test; OR
b) Score 550 or more in SAT II: Math Subject Exam (Level I/IC or Level II/IIC) if taken before May 1995. If taken May 1995 or later, score 570 or higher in Level I/IC or 520 or higher in Level II/IIC; OR
c) Achieve a minimum score of 28 on the mathematics section of the American College Test; OR
d) Achieve a score of 3, 4, or 5 on the Advanced Placement examination in Calculus AB or BC. Must be taken before enrolling in the College of Letters and Science; OR
e) Score 3, 4, or 5 on the Advanced Placement examination in Computer Science AB. The exam must be taken before enrolling in the College of Letters and Science; OR
f) Score 3, 4, 5 on the AP exam in Statistics. The exam must be taken before enrolling in the college of Letters and Science; OR
or
g) Score C or better on the GCE “A” Level Math Exam.
h) Complete one of the following courses at De Anza with a letter grade of “C” or better: MATH *1A, 1B, 1C, 1D, 2A, 2B, *10, 11, *12, 22, *23, (49A and 49B), CIS *21JA, *26A, 26B, 27, 28. (A course used to fulfill this requirement must be completed with a “C” or better; it may not be taken for CR/NC grade.)

3) Foreign Language:

This requirement may be satisfied in one of the following ways:

- a) Complete in a junior or senior high school three years of one foreign language with minimum grades of “C-”; OR
b) Score 550 on the College Board Foreign Language Achievement Test (SAT II Foreign Language Subject Exam), if taken before May 1995; score 590 or better if taken May 1995 or later; OR
c) Score at least 3 on a Foreign Language Advanced Placement examination (examination must be taken before enrollment in College of Letters and Science); OR
d) Achieve a grade of C or better on the GCE “O” Level or “A” Level Foreign Language Exam; OR
e) For nonnative speakers of English, demonstrate successful completion of three years of high school course work in one language other than the language of instruction. Check with the UC Berkeley Office of Undergraduate Admission and Relations with Schools for specific details; OR

- f) Complete De Anza College course 3 or 10 (or equivalent) in one language with minimum grades of “C.” (Note: A course taken in satisfaction of the foreign language requirement may not be taken on a CR/NC basis and may not be used as part of the six courses outside the major.) De Anza courses in Cantonese, French, German, Italian, Mandarin, Russian or Spanish apply.

B. Preparation for the Major

The instructions on this sheet specify only the breadth requirements of the College of Letters and Science. In addition, most majors require specific prerequisite courses which should be completed during the first two years of college in order to continue in that major during the junior year. Failure to complete these prerequisite courses will often result in denial of admission to the major of your choice, or if admitted, may lengthen the time required to complete the bachelor’s degree. The student should consult www.ASSIST.org and the UCB catalog for articulated major course requirements.

II. Additional Breadth Requirements for the B.A. Degree

The following additional requirements must be completed prior to graduation from UC Berkeley. It is to your advantage to complete as many of these courses as possible while at DAC. This will enable you to devote the proper amount of time to your major and other required upper division courses while in the College of Letters and Science at Berkeley.

A. American History and Institutions

This requirement may be met as follows:

- 1) High school grade of “C” or better in one year of U.S. History or 1/2 year of U.S. Government; or
- 2) If requirement was not satisfied in high school, by completion of HIST 17A or B or C or POLI 1 at DAC.

B. Seven Course Breadth

Guidelines:

- Requirements have to be met with course work, not Advanced Placement credit.
- Courses may be taken for a Grade (“C-” or better) or Passed/Not Passed (with a “P”, if “P” = “C-” or better)
- Courses must carry a minimum of two semester units.
- Courses from one’s major department may be used.
- Not more than two courses offered by the same department may be used.
- Courses used for breadth credit may not be used to meet Essential Skills (Reading and Composition, Quantitative Reasoning and Foreign Language) requirements.

The seven courses must be distributed among the following areas of study. **ONE COURSE MUST BE TAKEN IN EACH AREA.**

III. Transfer Requirements

In general, a student who has (1) completed at least 90 UC transferable units with a 2.4 GPA; (2) satisfied the minimum admission requirements (I.A above); and (3) completed the prerequisite courses for the intended major may be considered for transfer to the College of Letters and Science. However, to be competitive for admission, most majors require a GPA ranging from 2.8 to 4.0. Check with UCB departments for information on competitive GPAs.

No more than 105 quarter units will be applied toward the total bachelor’s degree unit requirement, although course content credit will be given for all transferable courses completed.
