## ADJUNCT SKILLS 232 SAMPLE LAB JOURNAL

## Follow this general format when responding with a journal. One page single-spaced.

Label Your Journal: Name: Date: Lab # and Title: Question: How will I apply what I learned to my courses?

• Your journal should be a personal and detailed reflection on what you will do with the information you have learned. Answer the question first! Start with your thesis statement.

This quarter and in my future classes, I will apply the *direct answer*, the *specific detail*, and the skills integration journal techniques in the following ways:

• Throughout the journal, use first person "I" to describe how *you* will use the strategies you learned from the skills lab materials and resources.

First, I will use *the direct answer technique* that I learned in this workshop to clearly answer the question that I'm being asked. In this case, the question, "How will I apply what I learned to my courses," asks me to give a personal, detailed response that relates to something *I will do in the future*. I learned that instructors generally look for the answer to a journal in the first or second sentence, so now I will use direct answer responses in courses that require me to write journals.

## • Provide specific details to your response.

Second, I will use the *specific detail technique* to support my answer. In this workshop, the instructor told me about a specific prewriting method called clustering that I can use to help me organize my thoughts before I begin to write. Through clustering, I can identify my topic, my main ideas, and my supporting details clearly. I make a cluster by first drawing a circle and writing in my topic. Then, I branch off two or three main points from my topic circle. From my main points, I list one or two specific supporting details. To complete this Skills lab journal, I will use a cluster to help me organize my thinking before I begin writing.

## • In which classes will the strategies help you the most? Why?

Finally, I can use the *skills integration technique* to show my instructors how I will use the information I learned. In my case, I can use all these strategies in my English and biology classes because each of them require that I write journals.
