Course Description:

Study the role of management accounting information in organizations for operational control, product and service costing, and performance measurement. (*Chapters 18-26*)

Course Objectives:

- Understand fundamental managerial accounting concepts.
- Discuss cost classification and cost assignment process.
- Discuss two cost accounting systems for manufacturing firms.
- Analyze cost behavior, break-even point, and relationship between costs, profits, and volume.



- Discuss budgeting systems and performance evaluations.
- Understand product pricing methods.
- Examine activity-based costing method for factory overhead costs.
- Study various analytical techniques for managerial decision making.

Course Format:

The course is a lecture course and will be of a "half-flipped classroom" format which is made up of lectures, illustrations, in-class exercises, group discussions, in-class quizzes, and post-class homework assignments – all of which are intended to reinforce your *pre-class reading* of each chapter. **Pre-class preparation, attendance, and timely completion of post-class homework assignments** will be critical to your success in this course

Homework:

There will be *nine* 12-point homework assignments (one for each chapter) covering the corresponding chapters that will have been already discussed in the class and they will be completed and submitted in *CengageNow*. Assignments are usually due right before we start discussing the next chapter but you should carefully check the due date of each assignment posted in *CengageNow*. It is important to stay current with all homework assignments and, therefore, there will be 10% penalties for late submissions. You still can submit assignments after due dates but only until the night right before the next exam covering corresponding chapters. Suggested answers and solutions will be made available in *CengageNow* when the assignments are closed and become unavailable. The maximum score will be 100 points.

In-class Quizzes:

There will be *nine* 10-point inc-class quizzes (one for each chapter) which will focus on measuring your comprehension of the subjects of each chapter. They will also serve as small sample tests and tools for group discussions. In addition, there will be **no makeup** without any exception. The maximum score will be 80 points.



Midterm Exams:

There will be 2 closed-book midterm exams (80 points each) and the better of the two will be doubled and included in final grading. **No make-up** will be given except for the situations stated below under "Make-up for Midterm Exams" section.

Final Exam:

This is a 2-hour long comprehensive closed-book final exam covering all 9 chapters discussed during the quarter. As stated in the school webpage, *you are responsible for taking the final exam at the time pre-scheduled by the school.* Refer to the weekly course calendar at the end of this syllabus or the school webpage for more details.

Extra Credit Assignments:

There will be *ten* additional *pre-class* assignments (3 points each) in *CengageNow* for extra credit to encourage and facilitate your pre-class preparations. These are usually due right before we start discussing the corresponding chapter but you should carefully check the due date of each assignment posted in *CengageNow*. It is important to complete all pre-class assignments on time and, therefore, there will be 1 point penalty for each late submission. You still can complete and submit these assignments after due dates but only until the night right before the next exam covering corresponding chapters. The maximum score will be 25 points.

Attendance:

Regular attendance is an obligation assumed by you at the time of registration and it is an integral part of your learning process. You will be marked absent if you don't show 30 minutes after class starts. You may also be dropped by the instructor if you miss 3 consecutive classes or 50% of the classes at anytime during the quarter. Also, late entries or early exits from class are disruptive to the class and should be avoided.



Student's Other Responsibilities:

- Withdrawal: As stated in the Schedule of Classes, it is your responsibility to drop or withdraw from the class other than the situation described above in "Attendance" section. If, for any reason, you do not complete the course and the appropriate forms are not timely completed and filed with the Office of Admissions and Records by you, you will receive a failing grade for the course. Check the school website for drop/withdrawal deadlines and other important dates.
- Keep all electronic devices, such as cell-phone and laptop, except for calculator, off the table during the class. If you plan to use e-book for the class or have other reasons that you should use electronic devices, you should obtain an explicit permission from the instructor in advance.

- If you were absent for any class, it is your responsibility to find out what you missed. You are strongly advised that you call a classmate and obtain any class handouts/notes/announcements you missed in a timely manner.
- Check emails (with email address provided to the school) on a regular basis for messages from the instructor.

Academic Integrity:

Make-up for Midterm Exams:

Make-up for midterm exams will be given *only* in the following circumstances with proof and **there will be no exceptions**.

- Jury duties: It must be communicated in advance and a copy of the sermon must be submitted at that time.
- Emergencies such as accidents, serious illness, and family issues: These must be accompanied by written support from a third party such as an accident report, doctor's note, and etc. Emergencies are very rare and you must contact and inform the instructor of the situation no later than 24 hours after the scheduled time of the exam that was missed.

Academic Accommodations:
