# **Course Description:**

This is the first of two-quarter Intermediate Accounting series and the main focus of the course is on accounting concepts, asset valuation, and revenue recognition. During the quarter the class will cover accounting conceptual framework, principal financial statements, time value of money, cash, receivables, inventory, long-lived assets, and revenue recognition issues (*13 chapters* from Ch.1 through Ch.12 and Ch.18).



### **Course Objectives:**

- Recognize and explain the environment of financial reporting and development of GAAP.
- Explain conceptual framework for financial reporting.
- Recognize and apply reporting requirements when preparing financial statements.
- Measure various present/future values in the accounting context applying time value of money concept.
- Recognize and apply financial accounting and reporting requirements to cash and receivables.
- Calculate values of inventory and cost of goods sold.
- Compare and assess additional inventory valuation methods.
- Recognize and apply GAAP to acquisition and disposal of long-lived assets.
- Understand various cost allocation methods for long-lived assets.
- Understand and apply the new revenue recognition standard announced in 2014.
- Discuss the existing differences between US GAAP and IFRS and the convergence status of the two accounting standards.

#### **Course Format:**

The course is a lecture course and will be of a "half-flipped classroom" format which is made up of lectures, illustrations, in-class exercises, group discussions, pre-class (optional for extra credit) and in-class quizzes, post-class homework assignments, and additional readings – all of which are intended to reinforce your pre-class readings of each chapter. **Pre-class preparation, attendance, and timely completion of post-class homework assignments** will be critical to your success in this course.

# In-class Quizzes:

There will be *eight* 10-point quizzes in class which will focus on measuring your comprehension of the subjects of each chapter. They will also serve as small sample tests and tools for group discussions. There will be **no makeup without any exception.** 

The maximum total score will be 70 points.



#### Homework:

There will be *eleven* of 12-point homework assignments starting from Ch.3 in *WileyPlus*. The assignments will be usually due the night right before the exam covering corresponding chapters but you should carefully check the due date of each assignment posted in *WileyPlus* as no late submissions will be accepted.

It is important to stay current with all homework assignments and you are strongly advised to complete them as early as possible – it will be ideal if you work on the assignment while we discuss the corresponding chapter in class and finish it before we start discussing the next chapter.

The maximum total score will be 120 points.

#### Midterm Exams:

There will be two closed-book midterm exams and **no make-up** will be given except for the situations stated below in "Make-up for Midterm Exam" section.

#### Final Exam:

This is a 2-hour long comprehensive closed-book final exam covering all 13 chapters discussed during the quarter. As stated in the school webpage, *you are responsible for taking the final exam at the time pre-scheduled by the school*. Refer to the course calendar at the end for more details or the school webpage.

# Extra Credit Assignments:

Pre-class preparation is so crucial for your successful completion of this course and extra credit will be provided to encourage everyone to read chapters *before* we discuss in class.

There will be 9 *pre-class online quizzes* posted in *WileyPlus* (3-point quiz for each chapter *starting from Ch.4*). Each quiz will be *due 2 hours before we start discussing the corresponding chapter in class* and it will be open and available in *WileyPlus* only for 48 hours. It is your responsibility to find the quizzes and complete them before they are past due as no late submissions will be accepted.

It is recommended that you set properly *WileyPlus* notification system so that you can receive an email when new assignments/quizzes are posted and when due dates are approaching. The official answers will be made available in the system right after due time for your review. These quizzes will also be used to measure your preparation level for the chapter and we will allocate our class discussion time based on the results.

The maximum total extra credit will be 25 points.

#### Attendance:

- Check emails (with email address provided to the school) on a regular basis for messages from the instructor.
