### DE ANZA COLLEGE Financial Aid Statistics 2019-20

- In 2019-20, De Anza College's Office of Financial Aid awarded over \$32,844,000 in financial aid to almost 9,000 students.
- Comparing aid awarded in 2018-19 to 2019-20, the total amount of aid awarded in dollars increased by \$5.2 million and by 10,764 total awards.
- Between 2018-19 and 2019-20, CCPG awards increased by 32%, loans decreased by 20%, and grants increased by 28%. Scholarship awards decreased by 40% or by 362 awards.
- Of all students who receive financial aid in 2018-19, 96% received some type of CCPG aid which suggests that almost all students who received financial aid received CCPG funds. Almost 60% of all financial aid students receive some type of grant, including Pell grants. Only 5% of students take out student loans, 5% receive scholarships, and 1% participate in the work study program.



- Of all racial/ethnic groups who received financial aid awards in 2019-20, the following groups received the following types of aid at the highest and lowest rates:
  - African American students received student loans at the highest rate and work study at the lowest rate.
  - Asian students participated in work study at the highest rate and took out loans at the lowest rate.
  - Filipinx students received CCPG and scholarships at the highest rate and participated in work study at the lowest rate
  - Latinx students received scholarships at the highest rate and participated in work study at the lowest rate.

- Of all students who receive financial aid in 2019-20, 96% received some type of CCPG aid
  which suggests that almost all students who received financial aid received CCPG funds.
  Almost 60% (57%) of all financial aid students receive some type of grant, including Pell
  grants. Only 5% of students take out student loans, 5% receive scholarships, and 1%
  participate in the work study program.
- In regards to the amount of aid dollars allocated in 2019-20, the majority of financial aid is
  distributed through grants which makes up 64% of all aid dollars awarded and over \$20.9
  million in aid. This is followed by CCPG funds which makes up 26% of all aid dollars
  awarded and over \$8.5 million in aid. The next largest are student loans which make up 8%
  of all aid which is over \$2.6 million dollars in aid.

- Comparing aid awarded in 2018-19 to 2019-20 to individual students, the total amount of aid awarded through CCPG funds increased 3 % pts from 93% of all students receiving CCPG aid to 96%. Grants awarded decreased 1 % pt from 42% of all students to 41%. Loans also decreased 2 % pts from 7% to 5%, scholarships remained stable at 5% as did work study at 1% of all students who received aid.
- In regards to the amount of aid awarded in dollars, CCPC funds increased 3 % pts from 22% of total aid to 26% while grants increased from 50% to 64% of total aid in dollars while loans decreased from 10% to 8% of total aid. Scholarships and work study remained stable at 1%.

- Comparing aid awarded in 2018-19 to 2019-20, the total amount of aid awarded in dollars increased by \$5.2 million and by 10,764 total awards.
- CCPG awards increased by 32%, grants by 28% and loans decreased by 20%. Scholarship awards decreased by 40% or by 362 total awards. Work study aid awards increased by 1%.
- Pell grants in particular increased by 7% or by 663 awards.

Chart 1. Percent of Financial Aid Awards in 2019-20 by Type and Ethnicity






Chart 1 compares financial aid awards in 2019-20 by each aid type across racial/ethnic groups to determine the rate at which each racial/ethnic group receives each type of aid.

The data points are displayed for:

- 1) the percent of the total student population who identify as such racial/ethnicity in 2019-20 (red bar)
- 2) the highest rate of financial aid awards for that particular racial/ethnic group and,
- the lowest rate of financial aid awards for that particular racial/ethnic group.

The goal is to have the percent representation in the population for each racial/ethnic group match the percent of aid awarded to that group for each aid type.

For example, African Americans comprised 4% of the total student population in 2019-20, so, theoretically, they should comprise 4% of all types of awards. Anything above 4% is overrepresentation and anything below 5% is underrepresentation.

### As displayed in Chart 1, the following groups have the highest and lowest rates of awards in each area:

- African American students receive student loans at the highest rate (19%) and participate in work study at the lowest rate (1%) and comprise 4% of the total student population, suggesting that there is an overrepresentation of Black students taking loans other forms of aid by 15 % points.
- Asian students participate in work study at the highest rate (56%) and receive student loans at the lowest rate (19%) and represent 45% of the total student population.
- Filipinx students receive CCPG aid at the highest rate (6%) and participate in work study at the lowest rate (1%) and comprise 6% of the student population.



### As displayed in Chart 1, cont:

- Latinx students receive scholarships at the highest rate (39%) and participate in work study at the lowest rate (23%) and comprise 25% of the student population.
- White students receive work study funds at the highest rate (19%) and Pell grants at the lowest rate (1%) and comprise 16% of the student population.
- Pacific Islander students receive student loans at the highest rate (2%) and CCPG funds at the lowest rate (1%) though making up only 1% of the student population.

- \* 3,260 unduplicated students received CARES funding.
- \* \$3,173,940.35 total CARES funds disbursed
- \* 2,599 were PELL recipients.
- \* 1,978 were PELL and full-time students.
- \* 162 dropped or withdrew from all their courses.
- \* 2,264 are currently enrolled in winter 2021 quarter.
- \* 272 have earned a degree and/or certificate.
- \* 99 have dropped out completely.
- \* 621 were Pell and part-time students
- \* 369 were non-Pell and full-time students
- \* 292 were non-pell and part-time students

# De Anza College Financial Aid Highlights CARES Act

Additional CARES Act funds to be awarded\*:

- Minority Serving Institution Funds: \$9000 out of \$29,884
- Institutional Portion Allocated for Student Grants: \$1,150,625 out of \$1.2 million

The remainder of both these funds will be awarded and disbursed by April 26th.

Aside from the CARES Act funds, we were also awarded an Emergency Relief Grant from the state in the amount of \$106,377. To date we have awarded and disbursed \$96,000. The remainder will be allocated prior to the end of the Spring quarter.

### **HEERF II aka CRSSA -**

- \$3,617,619 minimum for student grant aid
- HEERF III aka American Rescue Plan \$12 million for student grant aid to be awarded/disbursed through September 2023

We will be formulating a plan to include these emergency funds in our financial aid packages in order to minimize the length of time it takes for the students to receive their emergency funds.
