Student and Employee Technology Access – March 2020



Students

87% (2,543) have access to their own desktop or laptop.

3% (81) only have access to a smartphone.

91% (2,899) have access to reliable internet.



Faculty

98% (211) have access to a desktop or laptop.

2% (4) do not have access to a desktop or laptop.

87% (188) have access to reliable internet.

 $78\%\ (76)$ of classified employees indicated they are able to complete all or 75% or more of their job remotely.

40% (48) would like to be able to bring home electronics from the office.

16% (19) would like to be able to come to campus periodically to collect items.

Student Unemployment and Food and Housing Insecurity



March 2020 - Unemployment

40% (1,286) of respondents indicated they lost employment due to the Coronavirus.



June 2020 -Unemployment

48% (631) of respondents indicated they lost employment due to the Coronavirus.

40% (857) of students were food insecure:

23% (498) were food insecure with hunger

16% (359) were food insecure without hunger

November 2018 – Food & Housing Insecurity

June 2020 – Food & Housing Insecurity

49% (307) of students who are unemployed are food insecure compared to 25% (173) who were able to keep their jobs.

52% of students who are unemployed are housing insecure compared to 28% (195) who were able to keep their jobs.
