#### **Course Description**

As participants in this course, you will learn critical thinking and reasoning skills appropriate for effective problem solving in small groups. You will learn how to critically analyze arguments and how to formulate your own arguments through reasoning techniques. You will learn how to operate as a productive member of a problem-solving group. You will learn how to distinguish between questions of fact, value and policy and how to think reflectively about these questions.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

- **Student Learning Outcome**: Develop abilities to effectively facilitate discussions including active listening, nonverbal communication, managing tension, consensus building, and recording group discussion.
- **Student Learning Outcome**: Display increasing confidence in ability to use a range of models and methods for problem solving, decision making, and collaborating.
- **Student Learning Outcome**: Evaluate the effectiveness of group communication and critical decision-making through self-reflection and shared feedback.
- **Student Learning Outcome**: Develop, present, and critically evaluate informative and persuasive group presentations that are personalized to the audience, organized with an effective plan and purpose, and use information supported with quality sources that are accurately documented during the presentations and outlines.

### **Course Objectives**

Students successfully completing this course will be able to:

- 1) Distinguish between reasoning (e.g. explanation, argument) and other types of discourse (e.g. description, assertion).
- 2) Identify, analyze, and evaluate different types of reasoning.
- 3) Find and state crucial unstated assumptions in reasoning.
- 4) Evaluate factual claims or statements used in reasoning and evaluate the sources of evidence for such claims.
- 5) Locate, retrieve, organize, analyze, synthesize, and communicate information of relevance to the subject matter of the course.
- 6) Analyze, evaluate, and construct arguments/position papers about issues of diversity such as gender, class, ethnicity, and sexual orientation both in groups and on your own.
- 7) Present, analyze, evaluate and construct reasoning about other issues appropriate to the subject matter of the course.
- 8) Apply formal and informal methods for determining the validity of deductive reasoning and the strength of inductive reasoning, including a consideration of common fallacies in inductive and deductive reasoning.
- 9) Use qualitative reasoning skills orally and for written assignments. Produce argumentative essays.
- 10) Distinguish among questions of fact, value and policy; specify topoi, stock issues, or agendas suggested by each of the three types of questions.

### **Online Canvas**

You are required to complete the online materials during the quarter. Each week contains different readings, assignments and quizzes. You are to log onto your Canvas for this class to accesses each week. Each week's assignments will open on the Monday of that week and class Sunday night at 11:59pm of that week. You will need to complete the week's assignments within that time period. Attendance points are rewarded by completing each week's assignments.

Being aware of the grading criteria and knowing how to submit the assignments and discussion questions is an important step to staying on top of things in an online class. I am detailing some important need to know information which will help everyone understand the submission and grading process. Instructions on how to submit are also repeated in all the assignments towards the end of the assignment. Each assignment has clear guidelines to help you submit and not do something wrong. It is very important in the Canvas section to carefully read everything and follow the instructions. Most of the mistakes are committed from hasty or incomplete reading of the assignment and its writing and submission guidelines.

#### **B.** Assignments

- 1 As soon as you click on the assignment and scroll down to the bottom of the page, you will see a button which says 'Add Submission'. You will see statements above it let you know the submission and grading status for the assignment.
- 2. Clicking on this button opens up a text box, (scroll to the bottom of the page. It is going to open right below the assignment) you can type the response to the assignment or if you did it offline, cut copy paste it. Click on 'Saves Changes' button right below the text box. This saves your submission on the server. Please know that you can go back and change this assignment any number of times before the deadline. Each time the assignment will be updated with your changes when you click on 'Save changes'. After the deadline is past the system will still let you paste or type the assignment and submit it but it will be marked as a late submission. For late submission syllabus guidelines apply.
- 3. If when you paste the assignment and see a change in the formatting, please note that this is due to a compatibility issue with MSWord etc. Just paste the assignment in Notepad first which removes embedded coding and then paste it from Notepad onto the text box in Canvas. You should then be able to format the document without any trouble.

#### **Policies**

**Participation:** Since this is a course in communication competency, your regular attendance and participation is expected. This means that it is in your best interest to attend and actively participate in each and every session. By being present, by listening and reacting to the assigned activities, you contribute to the learning process for yourself and fellow classmates.
