## **Course Overview**

Welcome to COMM 1! This course will help you design organized, researched, extemporaneous speeches on topics of social significance adapted to a diverse audience. As an online Public Speaking class, we have a unique opportunity to leverage technology and practice our speaking skills in a virtual environment: My hope is that this course allows you to refine your skills in such a way that you will excel at delivering presentations in **all** environments, whether you are delivering a pitch on a conference call, or advocating for yourself and others in a room full of strangers. Together, I hope we create an experience that is not only comparable to, but exceeds that of a traditional COMM 1 course.

## **Course Policies**

## A Foreword Regarding Technology

Online courses can be a challenge for many, thus I will do what I can to ease the process and resolve any issues within my control (assignments not showing up, being unable to access documents, etc.). Regardless, discomfort or unfamiliarity with technology, or technical difficulties (software, hardware, or Wi-Fi issues) will not be an acceptable excuse for late or incomplete work in this course. **Attendance:** Failure to log in and complete assignments during the first 2 weeks of the session may result in being dropped from the course. Although this is an online course, please do not

mistake it for a *correspondence* course: You'll need to log on regularly and complete assignments, discussions, and other activities. Remember, this is a 5 unit course: Ideally, you should set aside a **minimum** of 5 hours over the week if you expect to be successful in this course.

Also, attendance will be taken at all speeches in your group for the class. You will be expected to be there the entire time and only valid medical excuses apply.

**Contacting the Instructor:** I am accessible via e-mail, office hours, or by phone. Remembering the following will ensure smooth communication between both of us:

- Ø Putting your **name**, **the course** and its **time** in the subject line helps me a lot (e.g. "Hinerman COMM 1 Online"). I receive a lot of e-mail each day, so I don't want to miss yours.
- Ø I'll usually respond within 24 hours (if not sooner) Monday through Friday.
- Ø Sometimes, I don't respond on weekends, so anything sent then may not see a response until Monday.
- Ø A simple greeting, a bit of kindness, or a funny story go a long way in establishing a good rapport. This is true in life as well....in case you didn't know, now's a good time to learn it.

Submitting Assignments: Keep the following in mind when submitting assignments

Ø Please use .doc, .docx, .rtf, or .pdf for submissions: depending on which online tech piece I'm using, I may or may not be able to open a .pages file.

Ø Unless I've explicitly requested it, please do not e-mail me an assignment. I will not accept it.

**Speeches:** Speeches in this class are conducted in a live, virtual environment using the Zoom app and they will take place for you at 5 specific times during the quarter, which you agree to the first week of class. Make sure you have access to a stable connection, a quiet space, and a functioning camera so that we can see you. I expect you to stay through the entire session to not only give your speech, but to be an audience member for your peers. Leaving early generally means I won't give you any feedback on your presentation. The dates for speeches are posted on the course calendar below.

**Late Work:** Sorry – no late work without a valid medical excuse....Allowances for assignments missed, as well as missed speeches, will require you to reach out and schedule a time for us to meet with me live (office hours, or Zoom) where we can discuss the issue and determine if a make-up is possible. Otherwise the assignment receives a 0.

**Academic Honesty:** Instances of academic misconduct will result in disciplinary action, which can include receiving a 0 on the assignment, or a recommendation for dismissal from the course. This includes, but is not limited to: plagiarism, submitting work from a previous course, submitting work written by an outside party, misrepresenting facts to receive a changed grade, etc.

I will reserve the right to go lower on the curve if there aren't enough grades in that rank - so a 90% will guarantee an A. I reserve the right to make it 89% if I feel the need. I'm sure you won't mind.

Speech Outline: Outlines are due for the final four speeches. You will be required to type these, and they must be full sentence, content outlines. They should be submitted online on the day of your speech, PRIOR to your speech in the appropriate area in Discussions. If, say, the section begins for you at 1:30, then the outline must be in then, and you cannot wait until your speech later in the hour to submit. If outlines come in AFTER your speech, you will receive a 0. Each is worth a maximum of five points, but points will be deducted if you do not follow the proper outline format.

I will not accept any late work.

MISSED PRESENTATIONS: If you are absent on the day you are assigned to make a presentation, you will receive a zero for that assignment unless you have a signed note from a physician that you were ill (we'll figure out the redo at the time). You must be online, signed in, ready to go at the time agreed, and you must show your face on camera to be counted in. If you show up online after everyone is done and logged out, that will be considered a "missed" class. Class will only continue as long as there are speeches to be delivered. So please, show up on time when the class begins.
