Course Description

This course emphasizes the practices and concepts shared by all photographic media. You will develop your idea to create your photographs, build up your vision, and finalize your body of work, which will be your portfolio throughout this course. We will also explore visual communication, how to connect you with your work, your work with the subject matters, and those with viewers.

Essential concepts and history will be discussed through lectures and presentations while students continue shooting based on your own theme, followed by reviews. The foundation of photography is accomplished by a productive work routine of shooting and looking at other photographers' work. You are encouraged to employ your aesthetic, intellectual, and emotional concerns as a basis for your photographic expressions.

Student Learning Outcome:

Demonstrate a working knowledge of advanced capture, processing, and printing skills for the organization of a final portfolio.
