Course Content and Grading Categories

Two Take-home Essays and Three Revision Assignments (40%): You will complete TWO multi-drafted (outline; first draft; final draft) 5-paragraph essays. You will revise THREE writing assignments from any class; you must submit both a draft and a revision, and your revisions will be graded on grammatical accuracy and quality of writing.

Grammar Paragraphs (35%): You will write a short paragraph (6-8 sentences) each week using grammar from the textbook correctly and appropriately. Some of these paragraphs will be responses to provided readings.

In-class Midterm Essay (10%): You will write and submit an abbreviated 4-paragraph essay in response to a provided prompt.

In-class Final Essay (15%): You will write and submit a 5-paragraph essay in response to a prompt.
