Course Description:

EWRT 2 is a transfer-level course that applies critical thinking skills to reading and writing, with particular attention to making and supporting arguments.

Course Goals:

- Analyze and confront personal as well as cultural values and assumptions.
- Gain competence as a critical thinker within established discourse.
- Recognize and evaluate alternative points of view and meanings.
- Summarize, synthesize, analyze, and interpret ideas and texts, including literary texts.
- Formulate arguments.
- Debate issues.
- Apply principles of argumentation and logic.
- Practice writing as a recursive process of discovery, planning, drafting, revising.
- Compose approximately 6,000 words of writing to be evaluated.
- Weigh the credibility of information sources and integrate outside sources into papers appropriately and responsibly.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will be assessed on their ability to perform the following skills:

- 1. Demonstrate academic (analytical, argumentative) writing based on the reading of complex texts.
- 2. Apply critical thinking skills to writing and complex readings. You will read two books this quarter: *Asking the Right Questions* and a non-fiction book of your choice (see list below).
- 3. Demonstrate analysis, comparison, synthesis, and documentation of independent research.

- 4. Write cogent, well-developed arguments that clearly articulate a thesis supported by textual evidence;
- 5. Select, evaluate, interpret, and synthesize sources in the service of an argument;
- 6. Document sources (print, electronic, and other) in MLA style.

Requirements:

You are responsible for spending at least three hours per week on our course Canvas page.

During those hours, you will be expected to do any of the following, as indicated for the week:

1. read instructor lecture notes and materials as posted;

2. watch videos related to course materials as posted;

3. listen to audio recordings related to course materials as posted; and

4. complete all posted assignments due that week by the deadline (these assignments may be reading quizzes, reader responses, discussion posts, and so forth).

You are also responsible for spending at least 3 hours per week completing the assigned reading and taking notes on the materials so that you can successfully complete the work for this course, including related quizzes, critical reader responses, and weekly forum discussions.

- Participation in class discussions and regular attendance as an online presence.
- Completion of assignments and readings on time to be able to engage in discussions.
- Three essays, including one timed essay exam, and one Final Research Paper
- Quizzes

How this course works:

This HYBRID COURSE will require attendance for 2 hours a week on campus and participation on Canvas for at least 3 hours per week. To pass this course, you are required to regularly log in to Canvas to complete assignments. The regular due dates for discussion posts, reading, drafts and final drafts of papers, peer reviews, and quizzes are to keep you on track. Please remember that the course also requires approximately 5 hours outside of class time to do the homework and reading. Thus, you can expect around 5-10 hours of work per week. Always look ahead since some of the assignments, like discussions, peer reviews and formal paper submissions require you to plan ahead so that you complete the paper on time.

Modules: Our online work is organized into modules, one for each of the 12 weeks of the course. It is best to access all work through Modules, rather than the To Do list,

as some assignments may not show up on the To Do list. Pay attention to due dates by when assignments need to be done. Some activities, such as peer reviews, cannot be done in advance because they are responses to your classmates, which means you have to wait for your classmates to post first. Your participation will include posting to online discussions almost weekly and interacting with other students online when there are group discussions or peer reviews involved.

DUE DATES: All submissions for each weekly Module are due by Sunday at 11:59 pm to obtain full credit for that work. The work in each week's Module must be done before moving on to the next Module. While I try to maintain the course schedule, due dates are subject to change depending on unforeseen circumstances.

Grading:

Students can expect instructor feedback on formal papers and assignments within a week of submission.
