Course Syllabus EWRT 2-59Z: "Critical Reading, Writing, and Thinking" (CRN 44401)

Course description: Develop critical thinking skills and the ability to apply these skills to reading and writing; develop analytical and argumentative academic essays based on reading of complex texts; and the use of outside research leading to analysis, comparison, and synthesis and a documented research paper

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs): Apply critical thinking skills to writing and complex readings; demonstrate academic (analytical, argumentative) writing based on complex texts; demonstrate analysis, comparison, synthesis, and documentation of independent research

Required texts (the first two are available through our <u>campus bookstore</u> and you can use either hard or electronic copies):

- 1. One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest (Ken Kesey)—the Penguin Classics edition (black and red cover)
- 2. Critical Thinking, Reading and Writing: A Brief Guide to Argument, 10th edition (Barnet, Bedau, O'Hara)
- 3. Far from Heaven (dir. Todd Haynes), rented from YouTube or another streaming platform

Accessing the course: Our class will be conducted through our Canvas course page. Typically, on Tuesdays by 6:00 pm, I will post the materials—the class lesson, discussion board(s), assignments, quizzes, etc.— for the upcoming week under "Modules." Please complete each component in the order it is placed in the weekly module: from top to bottom. You must complete these components by the

following Tuesday at 10:00 pm of that week or late penalties apply (see below). If the scheduling poses a challenge to you during a certain week or two (let's say you had to work overtime one week or you had essays due the same week for three classes), please communicate with me that same week. I am willing to adjust a few due dates here and there if you communicate a reasonable request. If you do not communicate with me during the week you are struggling, you risk falling too far behind, and I cannot help you. If you are granted an extension on an assignment, it is expected that you submit that assignment within five days of its original, posted due date unless you and I have agreed to a different, specific due date.

Communicating with me: I will hold scheduled online office hours on Tuesdays (see above for hours). During this time, you can send me any questions you have through Canvas messages (click on the "Inbox" and create a new message at the top) and you will receive an almost immediate response from me. You are, of course, welcome to send me questions outside of these office hours, but my responses will not be immediate. On weekdays, I will respond to your questions within 24 hours. On weekends (including Fridays), I will respond to your questions within 48 hours. If you don't hear from me within those timeframes and your message requires a response, please resend your message. You can also send me an email (see above for my address). If you prefer, we can arrange a phone call to chat about the class as well. I will also use "Announcements" on Canvas to send general class announcements, adjustments to the schedule, etc., so always read those announcements when they are posted.

Participation: Regular and substantial weekly participation in this course is mandatory: you must submit course assignments, engage in discussion groups, follow along with the course material provided, and write all four essays. Students are also required to engage with each other and me in an appropriate, respectful, and positive manner. If you do not show regular and substantial participation every week, you will be dropped from or receive an "F" in the class. Regular and substantial weekly participation requires that you not just log in to Canvas but also complete at least three assignments by their due date each week, including discussion boards, draft workshops, quizzes, reading guides, grammar work, and final drafts of papers, etc.

Fulfilling this participation policy will help you keep up with the work of the course without falling irrevocably behind, which can happen in online courses.

Academic dishonesty aka plagiarism: Academic dishonesty includes but is not limited to in-class cheating, plagiarism, knowingly assisting another student in cheating or plagiarism, or knowingly furnishing false information to college staff, faculty, administrators, or other officials.

Plagiarism means passing off someone else's work and ideas as your own, whether this is copying from a published source, downloading papers from the Internet, or purchasing papers from any source. Plagiarism also occurs when someone else writes any part of your paper for you. DO NOT PLAGIARIZE. Consequences of plagiarism will include an automatic zero on the first assignment that is plagiarized. If you plagiarize more than once, you will be dropped from the course (if the plagiarism occurs within the drop period) or be given in F in the course (if the plagiarism occurs after the drop period) and the department dean be notified, and you will be referred to the Vice President of Student Services for disciplinary action. If you're unsure about the boundaries of plagiarism and your own work, talk to me before you turn in your work, and we'll address the issue together. All of your essays will be submitted to Turnitin, a plagiarism detection site. You may also refer to "Academic Dishonesty" in the Student Handbook.

A simple way to avoid plagiarizing—and jeopardizing your standing in the class—is by citing every source you use to write or come up with ideas for your paper. Without exception, if you read anything as you prepare and write a paper, you must then include a properly formatted works cited page and acknowledge the sources for your ideas in your properly formatted in-text citations. If you need help understanding what a works cited page and/or in-text citations are, ask me or check out information on these in your Critical Thinking textbook.

How to turn in assignments: Assignments—whether they are quizzes or reading guides or essays—must be uploaded to Canvas by their due dates. Formal essays need to follow MLA formatting standards (see below).

Required Paper Formatting: All writing assignments must be typed using standard MLA format: 1" margins, titled, 12-point Times New Roman font, double-spaced, black ink, no title page, heading in upper left corner (your full name, your instructor's name, the name of the course, the due date of the assignment), last name and page number in upper right corner, and carefully edited for grammar and spelling mistakes. If you use any source to write your paper, you must also include a works cited page as well as properly cite all sources within your essay.

Late work: If you turn in an essay late, two points are deducted for every day it is late. Late essays will not be accepted after two weeks from their original due dates. You must turn in all four essays, or you will earn an "F" in or be dropped from the course. In other words, you must write all four essays for this class, and you must turn them in within fourteen days of their due dates (preferably on time, of course), or you will be dropped from or earn an "F" in the class. If you turn in small assignments up to two days late, you will receive half credit; if you turn in a small assignment three or more days late, you will earn zero credit for that assignment. If there are unique circumstances preventing you from turning in an assignment on time, please speak to me early in the week (soon after that week's materials have been posted), and we will try to work something out. It is always better to communicate with me rather than give up—remember I want you to succeed!

Checking your grades: Your ongoing grades for assignments will be posted on Canvas. Make sure you are given the correct score and that I see and grade any late work you may have turned in (sometimes late assignments can be overlooked and I don't want that to happen, so send me a friendly reminder!).

Grading comments: I will usually comment on your work—on the actual assignment as well as in the comment section of your individual, submitted assignment—beyond just giving you a grade, especially on major assignments. Please read my comments so that you can apply what I say to your future work and let me know if you ever have questions about my comments.

Week 5 (5/8):

Discuss One Flew, turn in paper #2

Homework: Read *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* (91-213)

Discuss One Flew, explain paper #3

Homework: Read *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* (214-260)

Week 7 (5/22):

Discuss One Flew, explain paper #3, prepare for essay #3

Homework: finish *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* (260-end)

Week 8 (5/29): *Please note 6/2 is the last day to drop a class with a "W."

Discuss One Flew, turn in outline for paper #3

Homework: Work on final draft of paper #3, find an article with a topic that interests you, read my article and respond to questions

Week 9 (6/5):

Turn in paper #3, explain paper #4, evaluating sources, discuss my article and yours and brainstorm ideas for paper #4, create works cited page for my sources, work on final draft of paper

Submit rough draft of paper #4 for workshop

Submit final draft of paper #4 by posted deadline. You cannot submit this essay late or you will fail the course (this is considered your final exam).
