COURSE DESCRIPTION (De Anza College Catalog)

This course explores visual imagery throughout the world for the purpose of developing visual literacy skills. Works of art will be studied by means of formal analysis, medium, the social experiences of artists, the function of works of art in their original environment, and comparison of works from different cultures. Primary emphasis will be on paintings, graphic works, and sculpture. **Recommended**: English Writing 1A or English as a Second Language 5

This is a fully online asynchronous course with images, concepts and vocabulary presented through PowerPoint video lectures, videos, written assignments, discussions and readings.

WEEKLY ASSIGNMENTS

In this course, the week ends on Sunday at 11:59PM (Canvas - Pacific Time). Students not in the Pacific Time Zone can adjust the time zone in Canvas under "Settings" to reflect their local time rather than calculating the difference in time zones for each assignment and exam.

Each week there is either a written assignment or a discussion post. Information about each assignment is found on Canvas under the Module for that week. All assignments are submitted through the Canvas assignment and <u>not emailed</u> to the instructor <u>nor posted</u> under the assignment's comments.

- Short written assignments are due on Sundays at 11:59PM.
- Discussions have two parts: A student's initial post to the question is due by Friday at 11:59PM. For full credit in a discussion a response to another student's post is due by Sunday at 11:59PM.

ART PAPER

This is a 3 to 4 page visual analysis of a work of art. Instructions for this assignment are posted on Canvas.

<u>Respect Disagreement</u>. People have the right to disagree with you. However, disagreement should never be personal. Online discussions are a means to share ideas and practice the skill of persuasion. Persuasive speech cannot be achieved with hurtful, hateful or inappropriate language. Review your posts before you publish and reread them for unintended meanings.

<u>Ask Questions</u>. Cultural influences can influence communication in terms of phrasing and word choice. The lack of visual and auditory clues may affect meaning, as well. Before jumping to conclusions, ask for clarification.

<u>Be Forgiving</u>. For the majority of participants, online communication is straight forward; however, sometimes unintended meanings are conveyed.
