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Course Information

Principles of Acting 20A is designed to introduce students to basic acting theories and techniques. It aims at developing an articulate vocabulary for practical acting experience, evaluation, assessment and critique. Students will become familiar with the control and function of the vocal instrument as well as become aware of the human body as an instrument for communication. Character development in dramatic scripts will be examined to familiarize students with the techniques of drama.

- While there are no required textbooks needed for the course, students will be required to read two plays of their choosing and should have access to them.

1. Students develop the voice and body as an instrument of expression while gaining confidence through the experience of interaction and audience performance.

3. Students progress critical thinking and interpersonal communication skills as well as diversity perspectives through collaborative projects.
