Ethics is a branch of philosophy that deals with questions like: what defines good and bad, right and wrong? How ought we to live our lives? Are we under any obligations at all besides what we want? What gives meaning to life? And finally, what kinds of choices should we make in particular situations? Together, we will be learning how to explore these kinds of questions, and the tools philosophers use to do it. We will work together to understand and develop a particular classical theory of ethics, the virtue ethics of Plato, as well as how to apply Platonic principles in practical, everyday situations where we face ethical choices.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Identify and analyze central questions about right action and/or the good life.
- Analyze and assess arguments and approaches to these questions from a variety of traditions.
- Articulate and defend a personal stance on at least one of these questions and/or traditions
- Formulate an application of this discourse to one's own personal decision making

Expectations:

- Make sure to read, watch, and listen to the assigned material, and I strongly encourage taking notes while you read.
- Our online classroom is a place for sharing and generating ideas. I expect civil, respectful discussions of our ideas. Everyone's perspective matters, and no one will be excluded.

Coursework:

- Weeks 1-11 will require you to engage in discussion each week on the assigned readings via Perusall. You will be reading course texts inside the Perusall app, which will allow you to comment on the text as you read, and allow you and others to respond to each other's comments. You will be expected to make comments of your own and respond to multiple other student comments.
- There will be a mid-term and final quiz during the course that will consist largely of material from the lectures, podcasts, and readings, so it's important to watch/listen to all the lectures and do all the readings while taking notes.
- Attendance/participation will be based upon you watching the course lectures, engaging
 with me in office hours or by email, and asking questions when you don't understand the
 material.

Policies:

- **Emails**: I generally try to respond to your emails within the week. Sometimes it will be longer, e.g. weekends and when I'm traveling. Budget your time accordingly, and email well in advance of deadlines. I almost never respond quickly to last minute emails.
